

Planning Update

Aldi: The new planning application for an Aldi supermarket on Portsmouth Road has recently been validated by the Planning department at Elmbridge Borough Council (EBC). You can view the application on the EBC website under reference 2025/1182. The Thames Ditton and Weston Green Residents' Association is reviewing the application and will be making appropriate representations to the council in due course. Your councillors will be involved in deciding on the application when it comes to the Planning Committee.

Hill Park **Roses** site: A new planning application is expected soon for up to 150 dwellings (with 50 per cent of the accommodation being affordable housing) on the Hill Park Roses site and surrounding areas on the land west of Woodstock Lane North in Long Ditton. This follows a public exhibition earlier in the year by the developers at Surbiton Hockey Club. The Residents Associations for Hinchley Wood and Thames Ditton and Weston Green (the site is in Hinchley Wood and Weston Green Ward) will review the application when it is registered. The RAs will be considering appropriate representations to the council on the proposals in due course. Your councillors will be involved in deciding on the application when it comes to the Planning Committee.

Community services transformation

Connected Communities - EBC reimagines its support for vulnerable residents

For over 30 years EBC has supported elderly residents with services including day centres, meals on wheels, transport, and dementia services. These are all discretionary services (i.e. not statutory), and they are very costly. EBC currently spends 20 per cent of its entire budget (over £4 million) on these services, but they only reach less than one per cent of our residents and user data suggests the majority of people using the centres are actually 'affluent achievers'. Meanwhile the level of real need in Elmbridge has risen to nearly 12 per cent of residents across all demographics, not just the elderly. So EBC is pioneering a new 'Connected Communities' approach, moving away from direct delivery of day centres and meals on wheels, and replacing a fixed 'one size fits all' model based in day centres with targeted, bespoke support services delivered through a team of Local Area Coordinators, working in the community. The existing six centres will stay, but instead of being

day centres they are being offered to local community groups and charities to take them on and run them for all the community, not just elderly residents. The Council will give them a support package of £130k to help them set up and they are commissioning a Local Infrastructure Organisation who will act as a resource to help with things like payroll, training, and fund-raising.

Cllr Gill Coates, who has led on this project says "We've looked at best practice from around the country and we are confident this new Connected Communities approach will enable EBC to reach out to over ten times more of the most vulnerable people in Elmbridge. We will be able to give more support to the community groups and charities working on the front line, we will help to create a network of thriving community centres run by the community for the entire community and we will ensure that anyone with complex needs gets support tailored to their individual circumstances. The new model will cost £1m less than the current day centre model, so it will be a far more efficient and effective way of using money, which will hopefully make these discretionary services more sustainable when we hand over to a new Unitary in 2027."

Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) Update

Surrey County Council (SCC) sent its LGR proposal to central Government in May. SCC and two of the 11 Districts and Boroughs, (Elmbridge and Mole Valley) proposed that Surrey should be split into two unitary authorities with Elmbridge being in the East Surrey area with Reigate and Banstead, Mole Valley, Tandridge and Epsom and Ewell. Elmbridge supports this proposal as do your Elmbridge councillors. The remaining Districts and Boroughs want Surrey to be split three ways, which would put Elmbridge in a Northern area, with Spelthorne and Runnymede. We are awaiting a decision from central government this autumn as to the number of unitary authorities Surrey will have from May 2026. Elections will be held on 7 May 2026 to vote for Councillors for the new unitary authorities. Then the new authority and Elmbridge will work alongside each other until 31 March 2027 when Elmbridge Borough Council and Surrey County Council will be dissolved.

which controls Primary Care, including the licensing of local pharmacies - has refused the application to reopen the pharmacy in the village. The exact wording of the decision is: 'The (Pharmaceutical Services Regulations) Committee determined that the application should be refused on the following basis: The PNA (Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment) has not identified an (sic) improvements or better access as required by Regulation 17 which this application could meet.' We are considering the decision report very carefully before deciding on what we do now. We have been led to believe from several authoritative sources that an Appeal is unlikely to succeed but as yet do not know what action the applicant will take. In the unlikely event that an appeal will be made, it is likely that it will be a very costly exercise probably requiring the services of a barrister.

Flooding Resilience and Prevention

The first of Thames Ditton's temporary flood barriers has been delivered and the installation tested. These are now stored ready for use in case of flood. The remaining barriers are expected in the next quarter. We have been successful in obtaining Community Infrastructure Levy funding to pay for Property Flood Resilience surveys for those residents with houses in areas at higher risk of flooding. We are liaising with the survey company and hope these will be conducted later in the autumn. We also met with Monica Harding, MP for Esher & Walton, who expressed her support for the Thames Ditton Flood Group. She is in talks with the Environment Agency (EA) and other MPs to further our efforts to protect Thames Ditton from flooding. In addition, we had a meeting with the EA who provided us with an update on their modelling https://check-long-term-flood-risk. (visit service.gov.uk/rivers-and-sea). EA is also reviewing and simplifying their approach to flood resilience. TD will continue to be under consideration for potential protection schemes but as other areas of the country may have stronger cost versus benefit cases, we are continuing to focus on property flood resilience.

Update from Nick Darby, our Surrey County Councillor



Residents and drivers will be pleased to know that several highways projects which promote road safety, are coming to fruition.

I am delighted to confirm – and as most readers will be aware – that white lining of the approaches to the Scilly Isles, has now been completed. Hopefully this will help avoid any confusion as to which lane you should be driving in. You should also have noticed that the Thames Ditton 20mph scheme has been extended to cover the section between the mini roundabout at the end of Watts Road, past the Cricket Club and up to the Portsmouth Road crossing. I am particularly pleased with the new signage.

White lining has also been carried out - as well as markings to the road humps - between Embercourt roundabout and the railway bridge. I am hopeful that further 20mph roundels will be installed beyond the railway bridge up to the junction with Watts Road. Finally and in relation to 20mph zones, you may have noticed that the 30mph sign outside the entrance to Colets and the Infants School, has been removed making the whole of Speer Road 20mph.

Without any guarantee with regard to exact timing, I have persuaded - after eight years of trying - Surrey Highways to resurface the entire length of St Leonards Road - from the fountain roundabout upto the Portsmouth Road. This is long overdue. This follows the resurfacing of Weston Green (by the Greyhound pub)

Finally, we all know of the need to repair the Heritage light on the Fountain roundabout. I have been in touch with what

seems like a cast of thousands for many months but I am delighted to report that the light has now been removed for repair and will be reinstalled, along with new electrics, hopefully soon.

Local Government Reorganisation

The Government Minister will be making a decision in the coming months as to whether Surrey is split into two or three unitary authorities. In the meantime various Surrey by-elections have taken place which has resulted in the Conservatives losing overall control of the County Council, the first time this has happened for many generations.

Separately and in any event, Surrey is likely to lose significant funding from central government, which may lead to cuts in services provided to council taxpayers. And as I warned in the last edition, ratepayers are already likely to face bigger council taxes due to having to pay off debts incurred by Woking Council. Worrying times.

Paddington Bear artist comes to Vital Village

A beautiful new work of art has come to Thames Ditton. The mural at the ice cream kiosk at the Vital Village Community Hub, has been generously donated by artist and local resident Gisella Stapleton, best known for her impressive mural of Paddington Bear outside Waterloo Station.

Her inspiration for the new mural at the Vital Village entrance was all things quintessentially English in the natural world: robins, roses and bumble bees. It brings vibrant colour and certainly makes the entrance more attractive.

Gisella came to national prominence when she was commissioned by Studio Canal to advertise the 'Paddington in Peru' movie at Waterloo and to celebrate Paddington Bear becoming London's first ever Welcome Ambassador. This mural recently won first place in the 'Best Use of Out of Home' at the Travel Marketing Awards 2025.

Gisella, originally from Lima in Peru, first inspiration to start painting was her mother who was also an artist. She was later influenced by the work of Guayasamin, Frida Kahlo and Matisse as well as the vibrant colours of Latin American folklore. She was recently the first ever Artist in Residence at Kew Gardens for its Orchid Festival, where she created art works to accompany and complement the plant displays and reflect the flora of the Peruvian rain forest.

Gisella's work can currently be seen in an exhibition at the Limping Fox in Rushett Road in Long Ditton, while she has also painted a new mural on the hoardings near John Lewis for the Kingston Street Art Festival, which took place at the end of August. Devices that can't be wiped on site will be securely processed back at Relove's accredited recycling facility.

In joining forces, Relove Technology and the Nature & Climate Festival, are making it easy -and safe - for our community to keep valuable tech in circulation and out of landfill. We will also be raising money for charity - Relove will donate all the value from your donated tech (after operational costs) to the Mayor of Elmbridge's charity (Community Fund for Elmbridge) and the David Shepherd Wildlife Foundation.

White Church hits £100k fund raising target



Louise Russell gives an update on the appeal for All Saints Church



The Appeal to raise £100,000 to Paint All Saints Weston Green - better known as the White Church - reached its target at the end of July. A big boost was given by a grant of £20,000 from the National Lottery Community Fund in addition to significant funding from the Elmbridge Community Infrastructure (CIL).

The project to repair and repaint the church is well ahead of schedule and although further costs have emerged as additional repairs have been identified, a resplendent white church should emerge from behind the scaffolding by the middle of September.

We would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to everyone in the community who has supported this project. The response has been tremendous with countless generous donations, without which this work would not have been possible. And of course our thanks to the many, many people who have come along to



support the fundraising events which have been happening every month since January and will continue into 2026.

To date these local events have included some memorable performances. Including the Twelfth Night Choral Concert by Ripieno Choir, Organ Recital by organ scholar Barnaby Silverstone, 'Back to Broadway' by Hinchley Wood School and 'Ember Big Band Remembers Weston's War', which alone raised £6,500. Other events have included an Ugly Bug Easter Trail, Weston Green Archive display and the stunning 'White Flower Festival, More recently a sponsored Weston Green history walk and Summer Recital have raised further funds.

There is a definite plan to keep this momentum going with further fundraising events planned to ensure that any additional costs beyond the £100,000 target can be met. Once that is achieved, funds will be

used to build a reserve to maintain the building into the future. This is particularly important now as listed places of worship of all denominations face the Government's planned withdrawal of VAT exemption from spring next year. 
It was a fitting send-off for a leader whose commitment over three and a half decades allowed over 800 children to discover the absolute joy of Scouting. He will be missed greatly.




