

Chairman's Report to the AGM



It is hard to believe a year has gone by since the last AGM and I am called on again to deliver the Chairman's report and let you know how we have got on against our objectives; namely to protect the amenities and further the interests of people who live in the area and encourage a community spirit.

The RA continues to appeal to local people and currently over 30% of the households in the area subscribe. I would like to thank Peter Haynes our membership secretary for all his work in this area.

We retain 5 RA Borough Councillors after Borough elections in May last year and, following Maureen Sheldrick's retirement after 16 years committed service, Lorraine Sharp was elected to serve alongside Tannia Shipley in Weston Green Ward and Ruth Lyon was again returned to serve alongside Karen Randolph and David Lowe in Thames Ditton. Peter Hickman continues to serve as the Dittons representation on Surrey County Council.

We continue to work to keep you both informed and involved through our Open Meetings, our website and Thames Ditton Today. The Open Meetings are held every couple of months and provide the opportunity for people to hear directly from RA councillors and officers, as well as ask questions and to provide input. The website continues to attract a high number of regular visitors including regional news media. It is an effective, low cost means of communication both ways with residents, providing opportunity for you to make your views known or engage in discussion through the forum. The facility to email those members who have given us their email addresses will continue to be used very sparingly to avoid adding to your inbox. The web address is in the magazine – or just Google 'Thames Ditton residents' or 'Weston Green residents' and you'll find it.

As a result of a merger at the printers the magazine is now being printed at higher quality. We have been able to hold the costs steady partly because more processing is done before material is taken to the printers. Advertising has held up well so far during the recession and there is still a waiting list: I would like to thank Verity Park our advertising manager for her sterling work. Advertising does not defray all costs of the magazine, and member subscriptions and contributions are essential to ensure its continuance. We thank members for those contributions, and the willing team of volunteers who distribute the magazine.

Keith Evetts has played a pivotal role in keeping residents informed, currently filling the role of editor of TDT and webmaster. I would like to record my thanks to him for all his hard work. It has become clear that while there is considerable synergy between magazine and website, the task of attending to both of them has grown to the point where we need to divide the work. We will therefore be looking to play in a new editor over the next few issues of TD Today, and Keith will then focus on overhauling and updating the website.

As we do report regularly through the year I intend to just highlight a few examples of the work of the past year.

Parking

In January Elmbridge Borough Council imposed significant increases of between 100% and a 150% on daily and termly parking charges at the Ashley Road Car Park. This hit office and shop employees as well as residents who need to park for more than a couple of hours. It emptied the car park as people chose to park on our overcrowded streets instead. We supported a petition organized by Helen Peters of Axos, and following a very cold Saturday morning outside the shops we, together with local traders, collected around 500 signatures from residents

requesting that the council roll back the increases. That has been presented to the EBC Cabinet and the council is currently reviewing the position.

It is worth reminding ourselves that, whilst EBC have responsibility for the Ashley Road Car Park, Surrey County Council has responsibility for on road parking. We are still awaiting a scheme from SCC regarding how best to manage on-street parking. SCC had insufficient funds to complete the consultation work and work up final proposals in the FY 08-09. That work is now due to be completed in this next year '09-'10 and any work would not start until 10-11. Peter Hickman will continue lobbying the council to complete this work.

Ember Centre

It seems to have been a bit of a year for petitions as we have also been active in petitioning EBC to maintain the Ember day centre for the elderly held twice a week here at the Vera Fletcher Hall with an active core of volunteers who help out. This enables older people to get out of their homes, socialise, have a hot meal and participate in a number of activities whether physical, educational or entertaining. As part of cost cutting measures (to save less than £17,000) the Cabinet at EBC had proposed to close the centre at the Hall and offer inferior facilities at St Helens down the road.

The Association joined with local church groups, local shops and others to raise a petition to the council to keep the Centre open. It was a measure of local rejection of the Council's proposals that within 10 days we had gathered a record breaking 2152 signatures. Residents Association members & officers attended both the EBC cabinet meeting and the full council meeting to make sure the councillors were in no doubt of the strength of feeling locally. The Cabinet instructed officials once again to look at the whole question of the Ember Centre.

On that note, the Association's executive also proposed to make small donation of £500 towards the purchase of computers to enable the Ember Centre to extend its activities and provide computer classes and access as part of the activities on offer.

Winters Bridge

We made a similar donation made last year towards improvement of parking at Winters Bridge to enable people to use the shops there. Traders and shoppers led by Chris Bachmann of the well-known patisserie had organised a petition asking for a lay-by for short-stay shoppers, as changes to the bus stop and the introduction of parking wardens was making life difficult. Councillor Peter Hickman's persistence steered the proposal through the Area Committee and with some funds from his council allocation, contributions from Bachmann's and from us sufficient money was secured to put in place the new layby which has proved a great success.

From time to time we look to donate small sums to enhance some aspect of the local community. These are only made once other costs are covered and after ensuring we maintain a healthy contingency fund. I trust that you are happy for the executive to continue these small contributions to our local area.

Planning

Your Association is not against development (no community can stand

still) but we do want to make sure it is appropriate for the area. The overall number of planning applications for Thames Ditton & Weston Green fell from 250 for the period March 2007/2008 to 210 for period March 2008 to March 2009. Whilst this reduction in numbers is not substantial, most applications were for extensions and minor changes such as tree surgery in the Conservation Areas. The number of new build applications for flats and the like has been very much lower clearly reflecting economic conditions.

Unfortunately, the fact that we may be seeing less development does not mean that we need to be less vigilant since current economic conditions will mean that developers are more tempted to cut corners. The work of the Association has more recently concentrated on ensuring that the Council enforce planning conditions.

You will have seen that after a considerable period of inactivity work has now started again in the High Street, on number 29 and the houses behind. However, once again it appears that the work does not comply with planning conditions. In the last few days, what appears to be no more than a plywood covering has been applied to the front of the building and this is in course of being painted. Councillors and Association Officers have been chasing EBC to come and take a look and make sure that the works will be compliant. Frankly we are very frustrated by the response from the Council planning staff but we continue to keep up the pressure. On the plus side we did succeed in having the proposal rejected to create five flats in the office building, that now houses Hawes Estate Agents, and that rejection was upheld on appeal.

Turning to Weston Green, there are three significant areas of potential development, the Olde Harrow, Newlands and the former Cottage Hospital.

The application to build on the Olde Harrow site that was rejected by Elmbridge has gone to appeal and we are supporting local residents in fighting the appeal. An entirely inappropriate development proposal for the Newlands, in Weston Green Road was withdrawn after considerable objections had been raised however a fresh application will no doubt be forthcoming.

The fate of the former Cottage Hospital building, again in Weston Green Road, is uncertain. We will resist any application that seeks to change use of the property away from a public amenity.

As in previous years, we have found that getting inappropriate planning applications rejected relies on getting good local support in the form of objection letters and, where cases go to Appeal, getting people to turn up at Hearings when these are held.

CHIP

Last year I said I found it disappointing that there is no overall plan for development of this important part of the village. The number of individual applications tests planning officers, residents and ourselves when looking to keep on top of what is actually going on and the overall impact of the plans.

This year as part of the Community Heritage Initiative Project (or CHIP) Elmbridge Borough Council have been reappraising the conservation areas of Thames Ditton and Giggs Hill Green in order to complete a comprehensive

character appraisal and proposals for managing the areas. Along with other bodies and individuals the Residents Association have taken an active role working with the consultants to articulate what gives these areas their character. We have sought to keep residents up to date with the project via TDT and the website. As the project progressed all households in the area have received an outline of the proposals and EBC staged an exhibition in the library. I hope you have all taken the opportunity to make your views known.

The final document will be used in preparation of the local development framework and as a basis for informing decision making. It will be a material consideration when it comes to considering planning applications. Our hope is, as a result of this work, there will be much tighter management of the conservation areas and help us to make sure any development enhances the local character.

Policing

We continue to have a good relationship with the police locally and our local beat officer Andy Grapsas usually holds a police panel meeting prior to our regular open meetings so do come along and meet him and stay on to discuss local issues.

Highways & Drainage

Whilst there have been no headlinegrabbing floods this year drainage continues to take up a great deal of time from our councillors and Andrew Roberts our Highways & Drainage convener. Last year when Tannia Shipley and Peter Hickman succeeded in getting network rail and SCC to clear the drains and culverts around Esher Station to alleviate flooding they warned that routine maintenance and clearance would be required to keep this problem under control. Unfortunately that has not happened and as a result we have had further flooding problems. As always Tannia and Peter are keeping up the pressure but take no pleasure in being proved right.

Andrew also took action to remove graffiti at Thames Ditton Station when it seemed impossible to get the responsible bodies to act.

Peter Hickman our SCC Councillor continues to keep the pressure on regarding highways whether in relation to getting lights fixed or verges cut. He has also gained agreement from SCC to make improvements to the school crossing near the station, we are now waiting for that work to start.

Our Weston Green Councillors had to act when once again antique tiles were stolen from the pavements at Weston Green and SCC refused to purchase 200 replacements. With residents they managed to gather together the tiles needed from spares that people had put aside.

Public Health

Our Elmbridge Borough Councillors and County Councillor continue to press for the NHS to make use of the beds at the Emberbrook hospital which we see as a key part of ensuring better healthcare local to home.

Community Spirit

The Christmas Fair was once again a great success and it is lovely to see residents out and about celebrating the Christmas spirit together. We organised the Christmas party for residents, provided the Christmas tree for the village and as we head into spring we have once again provided a number of bulbs to brighten us up:

News From the Residents' Association



24 March (AGM) to 22 May

The period since our AGM has been somewhat less frenetic than the four months over Winter and early Spring, that saw several major planning and other issues vigorously contested by residents and their Association, now in its 75th year. Villagers have turned with some relief to the many community pursuits of summertime.

Ember Centre

We are delighted to report that with the rallying of all who care about the elderly members of our community, we drove the Elmbridge Cabinet, out of touch with the views of residents and churches alike, to withdraw its plans to close the Ember Centre at the Vera Fletcher Hall. Indeed, the coming together of the community to see off this threat has re-invigorated the Ember Centre, boosted the work of its many volunteers and its membership, and attracted additional support. To go with the £500 pledged by the Residents' Association towards laptops for computer and internet lessons. Andrew Roberts (our Highways convenor) has donated a further £500.

Conservation

The final documents of Elmbridge's Community Heritage Initiative Project (CHIP) report on the Conservation Areas of Thames Ditton and Giggs hill Green should be published on EBC's website this month. They should provide an essential baseline of information and principles to be applied to planning applications in those areas. At our wellattended Open Meeting on 28 April the leading outside consultant for CHIP. James Webb, gave a useful roundup of the principles applied during the project. Meanwhile following the address to our AGM by Chairman of the Royal Society of Arts, conservationist Gerry Archer CBE LVO, the Association is exploring the idea of blue plaques for some of the buildings in these wards (not just the conservation areas) that have historic connotations for Thames Ditton and Weston Green. An article by Libby elsewhere in this issue expands upon this.

Meanwhile in Weston Green, where CHIP will look at the conservation area in due course, a new Conservation Street Sign has been installed with advice from Elmbridge's Heritage officer Clare Smith to mark the small line of houses known as Admiral's Row.

Trees

The CHIP project underscored how important to this flat and built-up area are the mature trees we enjoy. Having noted some trees being felled or severely damaged by owners in the area, the Association has renewed efforts to monitor significant trees, to urge sympathetic treatment by their owners and where appropriate seek further Tree Preservation Orders.

The ancient Holm oak at Harvest Lane was given attention early in May to remove one of its three trunks, re-brace the remaining two, and thin out the crown. The crack in the diseased trunk had opened perceptibly over the previous few months. The owners decided to put into effect the works agreed in planning application (2008/1616) (and thoughtfully informed us so that the situation could be properly explained to concerned visitors to our website). This much-loved tree should recover given time. It's an asset to the village skyline.

A horse chestnut at the Guy Salmon showroom was also found by arboricultural specialists to be badly diseased, so there was no option but for EBC to agree to it being felled. Guy Salmon are required to plant a replacement - preferably a red chestnut, more resistant to the disease that is afflicting the white chestnuts. The location of the new young tree will not be in exactly the same place but close to it.

Residents have been concerned about the magnificent copper beech felled in a property in Weston Park near Milbourne Pond. There was a preservation order on the tree, but it had *meripilus giganteus* and it had to be felled. The owners were very upset and consulted three arboriculturalists and the RHS. The council were also involved in the sad but inevitable decision.

Another horse chestnut, to be felled at Weston Green School, will also be replaced.

A question was asked at our last Open Meeting about the work done on the common near Newlands Avenue, in order to reinstate the original path. The path had become wider and wider because the drainage was very poor, and walkers were walking around the puddles in order to avoid them. Opening up the area should help dry out the path and the growth will then be reinstated on the edges - making the path narrower again. This area was long overdue for some maintenance. The last time it was done was in 1996. The Senior Countryside Ranger has confirmed that the trees removed along that section of Ditton Common consisted solely of conifers and holly trees, plus a number of dead elm trees, an elder bush, straggly hawthorns and one sycamore with squirrel damage. Ash trees of good form have been retained and these will become the next generation.

In order to preserve the edge of the common from erosion, wooden posts have been installed opposite The Newlands. What had become a muddy mess should swiftly green over.

Flowers

We love it when residents take a pride in their streets. Pamela Bannister has organised a hanging basket/window box competition among the residents in Queens Road. Pam writes: "Squires will judge the entries during the week of 29 June and the winner/runner-up will be announced during the week of Hampton Court Flower Show in July. The Albany Pub, situated at the end of Queens Road, runs a little daily ferry to and from the Flower Show and many local people walk down our road to make use of this. I thought it would be nice to support the Albany and generally enhance the appearance of the road by encouraging residents to show off their floral skills! The Albany chipped in with a meal for two, and Squires are giving a £50 voucher to the winner to support this initiative." Excellent.

Planning

A relatively quiet period, although the 29 High Street saga continues to give planning enforcement problems. There is no sign yet of a renewed application for The Newlands. The rejected proposals for the Harrow will be considered by the Planning Inspector on appeal on 2 June, after this is written but before it is published.

Surrey County Council's Executive failed to plan in good time for predictable demographic changes at both infants and secondary school level, despite pressure from our Councillors over the past two years to do so. To meet the shortfall, SCC proposed to erect a temporary "Portacabin" in the Conservation Area at Thames Ditton Infants School. The need for infant places in the Dittons is pressing; the school is excellent. But the County authorities must not be led to think that this temporary structure might de facto become 'permanent.' In granting permission, therefore, the Elmbridge area planning subcommittee has attached a firm condition limiting the cabin to five years.

Doings

The **Scout Fair, Regatta and Guides'** activities are reported on later pages in this issue.

Young **Charlotte Fraser**, who lives along Giggs Hill Green, recently received a Diana award from the Princess Diana foundation for her charitable fundraising work for The Back Up Trust, a national Spinal Injuries charity. In 2008 she attended a week long Back Up Youth Course for spinally injured teenagers in the Lake District. To help contribute to the cost of the course the charity encourage 'Buddies' to fundraise through activities. Charlotte came up with the idea of doing three rounds of the Harry Hawkes 8, one on a pushbike, one on a hand-bike specifically designed for paraplegics, and one in a wheelchair. She raised over £1,400 receiving sponsorship from all continents.

Photographer Keith Hern, a Thames Ditton resident who survived throat cancer in 2007, has been raising money for the Royal Marsden Hospital with a quiz night and other appeals to include a trek to the Arctic this summer. Blue Plaques for Red-Letter Days?



Have you ever walked around London and looked at some of the blue plaques in the city which give a little slice of history or insight into a street or a square? Perhaps it has surprised you to see that Boris Karloff (aka William Henry Pratt) was born in East Dulwich, or had a little shiver down your spine when you walk past the site where the first flying bomb hit London (Tower Hamlets). When you find a blue plaque on your walk, whether as part of your daily commute or on a sightseeing afternoon, you feel that you know a little more than when you started your day.

Have you ever thought that our little corner of the world, here in Thames Ditton or Weston Green, has a wealth of history that could give some parts of London a run for their money? Wouldn't it be as interesting for passers by to know that Marie Lloyd sang at the Albany Music Hall, a site near the Dittons Skiff & Punt club, or that the house boats of the time that were moored along that side of the river were the scene of many a party for the theatrical set of the

time. The industrially-minded among us might like to know that in the 1870s the brilliant engineers Peter Williams and Mark Robinson originally manufactured engines at Ferry Works.



Could this building be a good candidate for a blue plaque? In the same family of butchers for many years, and opposite the former village slaughterhouse at Stag's Court – one of the oldest surviving buildings here. In Victorian times was it the butcher's shop in the High Street run by Dick Porter, keeper of the Royal Deer at Hampton Court? Would someone like to do the research?

When Gerry Acher from Cobham Conservation & Heritage Trust came to talk to the Residents Association AGM at the end of March he told us about a blue plaque scheme the Trust runs in Cobham to identify places of historic interest.

It makes a pleasant and informative addition to a walk around Cobham and gives people a chance to consider the past and the people that have helped shape what is there today.

Gerry's talk got us thinking that there could be real potential for a blue plaque scheme here in Thames Ditton and Weston Green – and this coincided with our plans for marking the 75th anniversary this year of the Residents Association. The more we thought, the more it seemed that there may be a natural affinity between the two ideas. What if we were to mark this milestone by starting a similar local scheme here? Let There Be Light



St Nicholas' Church, the historic parish church of Thames Ditton, is launching a £200,000 appeal for major renovations to the church. We have had no choice. The church electrics failed our most recent five-yearly inspection and we must take steps to replace them. 80% of the church electrics are to do with lighting. A new lighting system has been designed for us by Bruce Kirk of 'Light Perceptions'. A display in the church showing the proposed fittings, specifically designed for St Nicholas', has been very well received. Their traditional appearance suits the character of the church but the scheme takes full advantage of technology to provide an economical and flexible system.

It soon became clear to us that to fund this scheme we should need to launch an appeal. But we also realised that there are other works we shall need to tackle in the very near future and that the only sensible option was to launch a comprehensive appeal rather than a series of small appeals.

What are these other works?

- To replace the heating boiler, which has become very unreliable and expensive, and which has sometimes failed when we most needed it.
- To improve access to the church for all, whatever their particular needs.

• To improve the landscaping and lighting of the churchyard, which we recognise is a key element of the Thames Ditton conservation area.

We have some funds available, and we are exploring possible grants, but in order to carry out these necessary plans we shall need the generous support of the local community. We shall be a launching a formal appeal shortly and we trust that all who value St Nicholas' Church and its surroundings will want to play their part in ensuring its success. Thank you.

Where The Bee Sucks



We haven't counted them but there seem to be lots of bees in Thames Ditton and Weston Green. We do mean the buzzy variety! Yet beekeepers and naturalists throughout England have become increasingly worried about a falloff in the bee population. Broadly, there are two kinds of bees. Honevbees live in large colonies of up to 50,000, generally cared for by beekeepers. Bumblebees live in much smaller family groups of an hundred or so in the Their numbers are wild. declining, but researchers are not sure why.

The drowsy sound of bees fumbling the flowers is a keynote of summer that we would not be without. So how can we help

them? Michael Evans, who when he is not dragooned by wife Sharon into serving in the Lime Tree deli is Chairman of Kingston Beekeepers, writes:

"Bumblebees live under the ground and in nooks and crannies, and feed on many garden flowers. You can stack old logs to provide shelter. There are many flowers you can plant to attract and nourish bees, and a quick search of the internet will furnish you with a list that includes bluebells, cotoneaster, lupins, honeysuckle and geraniums, as well as foxgloves and clover that not everyone wants in the garden. However, there's a

wealth of flowers for bees to feed on in all the gardens of this area, and in any case their main source of nectar is trees, so that doesn't seem to be the problem.

"Please don't spray flowers in bloom with insecticide. It can kill the bees as well as damaging the appearance of the flowers' petals. A bee will take poisoned nectar back to its nest. And don't let bees feed on honey you get from shops! A lot of imported honey is contaminated with American Foul Brood, which is very dangerous to our native honeybees: if a colony is found to be infected with AFB then by law it has to be destroyed. "Unlike wasps, bees are nothing to be afraid of: if you stay calm they will stay calm too, and you won't be stung. The bee will die if it stings you. Bee stings can be beneficial for arthritis, but a very small number of people can have a severe allergenic reaction to a sting that needs immediate medical treatment. If you are stung, scrape the sting off immediately to remove the venom and reduce the pain, and look for an antihistamine cream.

"Try to leave bumblebee nests undisturbed. It's very sad when we get calls from gardeners wishing to kill off bumblebees to make way for their next bit of garden decking."



To all staff: How to Get Our Message Across

The Council badly needs to have an image overhaul and our vision and top priorities need actualising. How do we lock this in? Our direction of travel must be reoriented so that our residents see that we have a robust approach to delivering value for money and that we are providing accessible outreach services through a basket of performance indicators. We must provide a comprehensive corporate toolkit, explore service synergies and ensure that our procurement processes and flagship activities are all showcased, so that they signpost residents and improve full functionality in our core services.

We will set up a working party partnered with a focus group to think outside the box and report on how we join up all aspects of our service. Residents protest against phone mast





Local residents have united to oppose a planning appeal by Vodafone to place a 14.4m phone mast and huge equipment cabinets in an area densely populated by families with young children. The equipment proposed by Vodafone would be along the footpath leading from the platforms at Esher Station to the part of Lower Green Road close to the turnstiles of Sandown Park Racecourse, on unregistered land.

Lower Green Residents' Committee, a group of concerned residents and parents, have joined together to voice their concerns over this planning application and to raise awareness among the community to ensure that this planning application is refused at Appeal.

This footpath is used not just by commuters but also by school children travelling to and from Esher High School. Accordingly, Vodafone's original planning application for the mast (application no. 2008/1951) was refused by Elmbridge Council last September on numerous grounds including, most importantly, safety. The proposed equipment cabinets are enormous, the largest of the two cabinets being 6ft 4ins tall, and if Vodafone get their way the cabinets will be placed on the unlit section of the pathway enclosed on one side by a 9ft railway embankment and on the other, by the Sandown Park Racecourse fence. It is common sense that this hiding place would provide

opportunities to harm vulnerable passersby, including our school children.

Furthermore, Vodafone would be placing their equipment up against the railway embankment. Introducing a telecomms "staircase" up onto the railway track (namely a lower cabinet – then pole – then higher cabinet), quite frankly beggars belief! However, as is their legal right, Vodafone have chosen to challenge the grounds of Elmbridge Council's decision. That Network Rail failed to respond to Elmbridge Council during the latter's consultation on the proposal is, in the view of local residents, equally remonstrable.

In order to provide coverage to this area, Vodafone were granted permission in 2006 to place antenna on the rooftop of Sandown Park Racecourse, alongside the equipment of 3 other mobile phone operators. Vodafone coverage in the area is felt to be good; thus the purpose of this 3G technology is not to improve existing coverage – rather to push non-essential TV, entertainment and other leisure services as a profit-making medium.

Residents are concerned also that if Vodafone's appeal is successful, it will open the floodgates for multiple applications from other mobile phone companies; one only has to look at the cluster of phone masts sited close to Hampton Court Station on Hampton Court Way to see that this a very real possibility. Indeed, there is already concern amongst residents about the health implications of these phone masts. Just recently, EU MEPs Elizabeth Lynne, Kathy Sinnott and Carl Schlyter have tabled in writing Declaration No. 47/2009 on the risks of exposure to electromagnetic fields resulting from the use of wireless technology.

Each time a new mast is approved, it becomes the line of sight for the next new mast potentially only a few hundreds metres away. It is therefore extremely important that residents with concerns, not only about this application but the insidious spread of phone masts amongst our homes, attend the forthcoming appeal.

As soon as the date of the appeal hearing is announced, all residents located within a 250m radius of the site will receive a leaflet from the Lower Green Residents' Committee urging them to attend the public hearing. The date will also be publicised as widely as possible, particularly given the holiday season coming up. For all the cogent reasons above, we ask you to support us.




