

News from the Residents' Association to end October



Local Plan Consultation

The second Local Plan consultation closed at the end of September. Elmbridge Borough Council (EBC) received 6,622 responses, of which 64% were from people who had not responded to the first consultation. Of the total responses received 85% selected Option 4 for their area. However, the response was varied across the borough with less than half of the respondents in four of the 10 areas choosing option 4.

The Residents' Association submitted a detailed response following discussions at our Open Meeting on September 24. See the article on page 13.

We are delighted to report that, after many months of intense negotiations and site visits, Network Rail has agreed that the lighting be installed – this work should be completed within the next couple of months.

Reducing Thames Water Traffic

Local residents (with support from RA Councillor Tannia Shipley) have been asking Thames Water to help pupils at Cranmere be safer by restricting their vehicles. Thames Water have agreed to stop their vehicles using Douglas Road at drop off and pick up times. Thames Water are

being very helpful and we are hopeful that the situation will improve.

Thames Water has an education department and they are hoping to work with Cranmere to provide a vehicle to show the children how hard it is to see them and to encourage them to be careful. They will also talk to pupils about the environmental issues regarding waste and the sewage system.

Planning

The proposed development at **Sandown Park Racecourse** (2019/0551) was refused unanimously. It is expected to go to appeal.

The application for 78 flats plus offices to replace current industrial units on **Hampton** Court Trading Estate, Summer Road (2019/2005) is still under consideration.

Land to the east of 74-128 Speer Road (2019/1721) and (2019/1691). Application 2019/1691 for two single storey detached buildings comprising 15 garage units has now been withdrawn necessitating a reconsultation on 2019/1721 (1 two-storey, three-bedroom dwelling within the built form of planning permission 2017/0818 (an office building).

George And Dragon Public House, Thames Ditton (2019/2346). An application is under consideration to replace the umbrellas at the front of the pub with a permanent pergola.

Currently there is no update for the application for the development of the **Jolly Boatman and Hampton Court Station** site (2018/3810).

Milbourne Pond

Update from Nick Darby, Surrey County Councillor



I had some difficulty working out where to start with Surrey news this time. Should it be that Surrey spends £1m a day on Adult Social Care and £0.5m (half) on Children's services? But a recent afternoon brought everything into sharp perspective - an example of the fabulous caring community with whom we share the Dittons.

Hattie, our eight-month-old black Lab, decided to investigate elsewhere as we momentarily had our backs turned with the garden gate open. An hour or so later, we had a call from the emergency vets in East Molesey to say Hattie had been found by a passer-by in Thames Ditton and handed in to them. Great relief all round! Much concern and kindness was expressed by those we spoke to in our searches. Our enormous thanks to all for their support.

As Vice Chair of the Surrey Adult and Health Select Committee we have frequent contact with various health bodies. Staff numbers are a big issue in Surrey, as elsewhere, despite protestations of more money now being available. There is great concern over the falling numbers of children and others who have had the MMR vaccination. Similar concern exists over the flu jab – many, including those over 65, can have them free.

On other matters: -

 Significant gas main replacement works are due in St Leonards Road. While Surrey have little choice when dealing with utility companies, I am hoping that following recent disruption in nearby Southbank, the same contractors will have learned

- 2) Extinction Rebellion visited our last two full Council meetings interesting for me to follow the Leader's speech knowing they were in the public gallery!
- 3) There is still work to be done for secondary school places in the Dittons but the new extended bus service from Thames Ditton to Three Rivers has started well
- 4) We are looking at parking changes on Weston Green Road, both to assist residents, and to ensure the bus does not get held up
- 5) In the latest Heathrow consultation, Surrey County Council expressed concerns on many aspects, from the lack of southern rail access, traffic, air quality and pollution, to noise from aircraft rerouting and massively increased flights. Our Residents Association and Elmbridge Borough Council have said much the same.

Local Plan— why this is a great place to live



The Thames Ditton and Weston Green Residents' Association made an extensive submission to the Local Plan Consultation. The full response can be found on our website *residents-association.com*. Here is our answer to question 3a. What are the key characteristics that make your area a great place to live?

Thames Ditton, Weston Green and East Molesey are attractive places to live, with excellent facilities as well as green spaces.

Our area has a unique identity benefiting from its close proximity to London with excellent transport links with access to the A3, M3 and M25, easy access to both Heathrow and Gatwick Airports and several South Western Railway train lines into London Waterloo, whilst keeping its village character with great cultural heritage. A network of green spaces, commons, parks and rivers contribute to the vibrancy that make Thames Ditton, Weston Green and East Molesey special places to live, work in, or visit.

Overall, the character of Thames Ditton, Weston Green and East Molesey is generally "suburban with a village atmosphere". Many residents use the excellent transport links to commute into London, but the area is also home to a variety of smaller and mid-sized businesses which is attractive to residents who wish to live close to their workplace. The area has lower density residential housing compared with the neighbouring Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames. Thames Ditton, Weston Green and East Molesey are characterised by a mix of (larger) detached properties, semi-detached houses and terraces. These are generally a mix of inter-war, Victorian



and Edwardian homes often on larger plots including front and rear gardens.

We are lucky enough to have three rivers flowing through our communities, the Thames, the Ember and the River Mole. All rivers offer a great deal to residents, from boat trips, and rowing, to walks along the river's edge and nearby countryside.

The surrounding green spaces and commons provide rich havens for wildlife and places for residents to explore for walking or on horse-back and for other

outdoor activities. The green spaces, including the places designated as part of the Green Belt, are major green assets which give our part of Elmbridge an exceptional character.

The Thames Path touches on the northern fringes of East Molesey before crossing Hampton Court Bridge and following the tow path on the north bank of the Thames opposite Thames Ditton. Other footpaths provide residents with easy access to the green spaces, and as a result of this, the open spaces are frequently used by residents.

Thames Ditton, Weston Green and East Molesey are also attractive places to live on account of outstanding local schools. There is considerable pressure on our local secondary school in Hinchley Wood as a result of this.

Residents are keen to maintain the attractiveness of our local High Streets, for example the High Street in Thames Ditton and Bridge Road in East Molesey. Thames Ditton has established a vibrant farmers' market which takes place monthly.

The area is also home to a variety of longestablished sport clubs which make use of sports fields, recreation grounds, Ditton Common and Giggs Hill Green common in Thames Ditton.

Overall, residents enjoy our unique communities because they provide them with a sense of space and neighbourhood safety. Many residents live in our villages over decades and are keen to preserve the character of the area that they have bonded with.

Kane enables



Sandi Johnson has lived in Thames Ditton for most of her life. She was born in South Africa, because her mother, a Scottish nurse, was permitted to travel to Johannesburg to stay with her diplomat brother when she asked her parents if she could see some of the world. There she met and married Sandi's father and they returned to the UK when Sandi was four.

They initially set up home in Osterley until Sandi began a love affair with horses when she became a Hampton Court Ranger, and her parents a love affair with Thames Ditton while they were hanging around waiting for her to finish. Sandi said: 'They would hire a boat at Hampton Court and go down to Thames Ditton Island where they saw a house for sale which was vacant. They had picnics on the lawn before they even made an offer – a kind of try before you buy!'

By the time Sandi was at Thames Ditton Middle School, the school eyesight test picked up that she had a problem. It turned out to be a rare combination of genes which gave her Stargartds Disease - a genetic condition which kills the central vision, leaving her no facial recognition or detail and only peripheral vision, which deteriorates in all of us as we age.

With time Sandi began to feel more isolated as her sight worsened and her independence diminished. 'I started bumping into things and would wave down a dustbin lorry at a request bus stop, or I would be approached by security guards in the supermarket when trying to dig out my magnifying glass, until I explained that I wasn't shoplifting. After

a while it wore me down and I more or less stopped going out'.

Cue Kane...

Kane is the black, sleek Labrador with an affectionate tongue who never leaves Sandi's side. He has changed her life. He wasn't a straight 'A' student at Guide Dog school, but Sandi has partial sight and so they felt the risk was small and he landed the job. After a gradual bonding 18 months ago, they are now the perfect couple. Since having Kane she finds people are so much more friendly and helpful, for example in assisting her to use public transport. She has since been on an aeroplane and is now thinking of doing a cruise. She's even been to the theatre for an audio performance of Hamilton and said: 'While we were inside enjoying the show the staff treated the guide dogs like royalty, they were having a bun fight out there and even dressed up in the costumes!'

A friend encouraged Sandi to go on the guide dog waiting list which she had resisted it for the selfless reason that it would make her disability more visible and this could stigmatise her teenage son. Guide Dogs Kingston set about matching her to a suitable dog using their process, which includes working out a person's leg length, speed of walking and ability to trust by using a trained human in a harness!

Sandi quipped: 'Walking past Esher College where my son was studying and hearing 'you've forgotten your dog love' was not the most auspicious of starts, but it made me more determined to educate people to promote awareness and increase understanding'.

Sandi has since given talks at Esher College and elsewhere about Guide Dogs Kingston, and the students love stroking Kane for exam stress therapy.

From birth to retirement a guide dog costs £57,000 and with no government funding for guide dogs, the charity, Guide Dogs UK, relies entirely on voluntary donations.

Working in leafy Thames Ditton, Kane has a pretty good life - and a girlfriend who lives just round the corner! Kane is the main reason for Sandi's transformation and her gratitude drives her to work tirelessly for Guide Dogs Kingston to promote awareness and fundraise. Listening to Sandi was like watching a firecracker go off as she has so many creative fundraising ideas.

Technology has also played its part in helping Sandi regain her independence, such as the integrated speaking and expansion system provided by Apple, Google maps and Contactless, which allows her to independently shop up to £30. Sandi has also started using a new app to recognise faces and products and even read books ... but none of them are as cuddly as Kane.

Volunteering alongside the energetic Sandi to help promote awareness of and raise money for Guide Dogs Kingston sounds like a lot of fun and even an hour of your time every month or so would be really welcomed. Celebrating Christmas, local Christmas services



In the bleak midwinter

At this time of year, the days may often seem short and dark and in Christina Rossetti's words 'bleak', but for Christians, Advent, the four weeks before Christmas, is one of the most joyous times of the year. Christmas is coming and all are preparing to celebrate the birth of the Christ child. Christmas trees appear, mince pies are eaten, stockings hung by the fire and carols sung – all traditions that point out that this is a special time.

In our increasingly secular world, many say that Christmas has been hijacked as a commercial event. Certainly, mince pies and Christmas cards seem to appear ever earlier in the shops. However, even for non-Christians and those no longer practising the faith, there is an excitement, an awe about Christmas that attracts them to hear the magical old story of the birth of Christ and to join in the celebration.

This year Advent begins on 1 December. All of our churches have a variety of Christmas activities (in addition to the normal services) to which all are welcome – whether you are a Christian or not. The children's activities range from Toy Services when congregations bring in toys that will be donated to various local charities, Christingle services, Crib services and a Children's Christmas Eve Candlelight service. There are also children's Christmas parties and arts and crafts sessions.

For adults there are the Nine Lessons and Carols services in which the Christmas narrative is intermingled with carols.



Growing older in Elmbridge





A welcome awaits at your local community centre

A chance meeting with a resident at a local supermarket galvanised me into writing. She was shopping for an elderly neighbour who she described as 'lonely and in need of help' because her children live away. I asked if the neighbour had any support – had she been in touch with Elmbridge Borough Council? The response was 'what can the council do – there is no support for older people?'

How very wrong can you be?!

Support for older people in this borough is second to none. While boroughs throughout the country (including Surrey) have closed, or are closing, their centres. Elmbridge has seven thriving Community Centres – Claygate, Cobham, Hersham, Molesey, Thames Ditton (operating two days a week; Mon and Thurs) Walton and Weybridge. Each centre is 'buzzing' and provides a bespoke service to the community it serves.

Gone is the old image of Day Centres being a place where people sit, have lunch and then go home. The reality is the complete opposite. They are about meeting people, joining in the myriad of activities and classes on offer, generally being sociable, supporting one another, and having fun! New friendships are formed and these friends get together for other activities outside the centres. On a recent visit to a centre I chatted with many attendees and soon became convinced that their social life was more exciting than mine!

Elmbridge's centres run computer clubs, art clubs, exercise groups, Tai chi, curling and boccia, community yoga, singing classes, whist, bingo, sequence dancing, bridge clubs and film sessions. Reflexology, beauty and aromatherapy therapists and hairdressers visit the centres, as well as chiropodists and physiotherapists. Each centre also runs its own events calendar

with all sorts of varied and interesting activities and outings.

There are specialist groups supporting people with dementia and Alzheimer's disease – they operate through the Relief Carers' Scheme. At the start of this year the Community Support Service launched its twelfth day-care group.

A 'Tovatafel' has recently been launched at the Thames Ditton Centre. This is a multi-media table that helps people who have a cognitive challenge, from children with autism to people with dementia. It's an amazing bit of technology and the positive impact it has on those with dementia is astounding. Have a look on the internet to see it in action.

A Day-Care service operates in the Cobham Centre supporting people with learning disabilities. It began with 10 people attending in 2011 and now has 86 regular attendees.

The Thames Ditton Centre runs an extremely successful 'Men in Sheds' project and, more recently, 'Gardening Under Glass' was launched at the Molesey Centre. There are Stroke Groups, Parkinson Groups and an Alz Café.

Earlier this month the 'Safe Places' initiative was launched. This is a countrywide initiative and it is being piloted in Walton and will be rolled out to the whole borough. A 'safe place' is somewhere where someone who is unsure, feels unsafe or anxious can go for help. It can be a shop, café, business, or community centre. Someone there will be able to offer reassurance, some refreshment, and general help.

The Community Alarm service supports 1,700 residents, helping people to stay in their own home.

A new product called 'Elm Assist' has recently been launched. It's a compact device that has an emergency button for easy two-way calling. It can be used whilst out and about. This provides independence for the user and reassurance for their relatives and those who care for them.

These services are the tip of the iceberg – there are many more! This outstanding work would not be possible but for the dedication and hard work of the excellent team at EBC's Community Support Services. The borough also has a highly committed band of volunteers who support all the services from Meals on Wheels (over 100,000 centre and meals on wheels produced every year!) to supporting tea bars and helping with a myriad of other activities.

I think you would agree that, if you are lucky enough to be growing older, the place to do it is in Elmbridge!



Café Bridge fundraising for Momentum Children's Charity in Bridge Road

On Thursday December 5 from 10.15am-4.30pm Café Bridge will be running their third hugely enjoyable bridge event in Bridge Road, East Molesey. This time they are raising money for the Momentum Children's Charity. Feedback from last year's event includes: "Sorry but absolutely no suggestions as to how to improve the event. Really just about the most enjoyable Café Bridge Liz and I have participated in."

Café Bridge events are a duplicate pair's game which is set up to run in multiple restaurants and cafés within 250 metres of one another. Pairs of players move to a new venue after each round, guided by a movement card, while boards remain on their starting tables throughout. The registration fee covers refreshments at the venues, for either lunch or drinks at each stop depending on the event and also a charitable donation. Café Bridge usually runs at a time during the week when the host restaurants and cafés are less well attended and with 160 participants already signed up for the Bridge Road event, this brings very

welcome extra custom to the venues when they are generally quieter.

Café Bridge events have been organised in the UK since 2015 raising thousands of pounds for charities, mainly in London and the Home Counties. The longest running in the UK is Guildford Café Bridge which is in its ninth year and has raised over £30,000. Almost all Café Bridge events have a component of raising money for a good cause. In the past, charities that have benefited include The Downs Syndrome Association, The Princess Alice Hospice and many others. Often the beneficiary charity is chosen because of a personal relationship with one of the organisers, which allows the charity to be involved on the day.

This year, the charity chosen to benefit from the Café Bridge event on December 5 is Momentum Children's Charity. The charity was founded by Bianca Effemey in 2004 when she was working in the Paediatric Department at Kingston Hospital. Here she saw the incredible challenges facing

The Sleepy Pebble and other stories

In my family, bedtime can be a fraught affair, with children over-tired from school, clubs, activities and homework. From talking to other parents, I know that we're not alone. Some children go to sleep easily, but others find it hard to wind down and relax at bedtime.

So, when Professor Alice Gregory, a sleep expert and author of *Nodding Off:* The Science of Sleep from Cradle to Grave (Bloomsbury, 2018), approached me with the idea of co-writing a children's book to help children relax at bedtime, I jumped at the chance. Like Alice, I was excited by the idea and we drafted a story, 'The Sleepy Pebble', that embedded into a story scientifically grounded techniques – imagery, muscle relaxation and mindfulness.

Alice and I ran a small pilot study to trial the story, inviting 100 families (who had at least one child aged between 3 and 11) to take part. The feedback we received was largely positive and gave us useful information for improving the book. We decided to move forwards with the project.

We found a publisher, the delightful Flying Eye Books, and got to work on more stories for the book. We wanted the stories to incorporate themes and characters based in nature, so started to think of ideas. Alice lives in Teddington and I live in Weston Green, so we are both lucky to have access to numerous ponds, wooded areas, parks and greens – and with young children who needed entertaining, we spent a lot of time out and about in them.

Alice suggested writing a story about a tree, but we struggled to make it work. Then one day, as my daughter and I were feeding the ducks at Marney's pond, I looked up at

the beautiful tree there and came up with the character of Willow, a tree who wants nothing more than to stay up late on her birthday. I sent the story to Alice and we agreed that this was to be our tree story.

Together, Alice and I came up with five stories for the final book, with the other stories focusing on a snail, giraffe and a pot-bellied pig. Then Eleanor Hardiman illustrated the stories. It was a dream come true to see our little characters — who by now had become friends to us — become real.

Our book was published in October, and it's been wonderful (and a little bit nervewracking!) to watch it appear on children's bookshelves. Our little pebble's journey into the outside world has begun and we hope that our book is making bedtimes that little bit easier for families.



The Williamses, and the Newlands

I first came across the Williams family in the parish when among the witnesses at the 1841 ecclesiastical trial of the vicar, Rev. Wilfred Speer, for habitual drunkenness on duty, was Captain Rowland Edward Louis Charles Williams. Williams deposed among other things that the vicar had made a parochial visit to him before dinner one day in 1836 and was clearly intoxicated – to the extent of mounting his horse to leave, and immediately falling off the other side of it.

Since then I have never been able to pass the entrance of The Newlands, Williams' home in Weston Green, without picturing that memorable scene. Capt. Williams then departed for his plantation interests in the Caribbean without cross-examination by the court, which had plenty of other witnesses before it – nearly all the notables in the parish.

I next happened upon the Williamses in my researches into the Lambert family of Weston House, across the green from The Newlands, particularly during the period

1799-1805 when Catherine Lambert struck up a friendship with Mrs. Mary Williams. mother of the above Captain. The daughter of Robert Symes, of Esher and Jamaica, Mary had married Rowland Edward Williams of Antigua and Thames Ditton, born 18 Dec 1748, died November 1826 and buried at Thames Ditton, who inherited from his father several slave plantations, mainly in Antigua, along with The Newlands. The Williamses thus had much in common with other slave plantation owners in the parish, including Catherine Lambert who inherited a plantation in Jamaica where she was born Catherine Byndloss; Robert Taylor of Imber Court and the Lord of the Manors of Imber and Weston, a former captain of ship for the East India Company who became a slave trader as well as plantation owner (and acted for his brother who was reputedly the biggest slave owner in Jamaica), leaving the plantations to his son-in-law Sir Charles Sullivan: Charles Rose Ellis, who owned Claremont in Esher - and ten thousand acres of Jamaican plantations - for a while; and not least Rev. Wilfred's predecessor as vicar here, Rev. William Ellis, who gained along with his first wife his presentation to the living and a large interest in slave plantations in Demerara.

Wild days of Caribbean conquest

There was quite a long line of these Williamses, who may have hailed originally from Penrhyn, extending back to the 1600s and the desperate days of derring-do as the Caribbean was colonized by the rival powers of Western Europe. The rather bloodthirsty indigenous Caribs of the Lesser Antilles, wont to butcher the settlers and abduct their wives and children, were largely extinguished (some 3000 now remain) before the French, Dutch, Spanish and English set to among themselves to

determine which among them should establish their version of civilization on which islands, with the use of slaves bought from their fellow Africans in Africa and shipped in appalling circumstances to the new plantations. There was money to be made; but not without danger and bravery, in times when ethics were a minor consideration.

The father of the first identifiable Rowland Williams, who might himself have been named Rowland, reputedly emigrated under the auspices of William Herbert, Earl of Pembroke, and is said to have been the first colonist from these shores to set foot in the Island of Antigua, a medium-sized island some 28 miles by 22 miles in the Leeward Islands. He planted and settled what became the first part of the family estate at Old Road. In about 1632 he had a son. Rowland Williams, who is said to have been the first white child born in the colony. This Rowland Williams, an active officer in the militia forces that provided security on the island, had an eventful life. In 1668 he was granted 300 acres; promoted Lieutenant 1669, Major 1671, Lieutenant-Colonel 1676, and a year later full Colonel, by which rank he was thereafter known. In 1676 he bought a further 230-acre estate on the island.

In 1671, Antigua became part of the newly formed colony of the Leeward Islands and a Lieutenant Governor was appointed on Antigua to oversee domestic affairs. In 1676 we have a detailed account of facilities on the island, which by that stage had one church. The militia numbered around 800 men, with 33 horse, and there were three forts and sixteen cannon – eight twelve-pounders and eight eight-pounders. Lt. Col. Rowland Williams was second in command under Col. Philip Warner. The 'manurable' acreage on the island was 100,000. A thousand slaves were imported yearly to the

Leeward Islands for £20,000.

Colonel Rowland Williams became the second Lieutenant Governor, from 1675 to 1678, and then served again in that capacity 1689-1692, when he was made a Clerk of the Navy. In 1690 he commanded a contingent of some 800 men from Antigua which contributed to a force of 2300 soldiers and 200 sailors under the captain-general of the Leeward Islands, Christopher Codrington, which retook the twin islands of St. Kitts and Nevis from the French. Codrington's account makes interesting reading for the military minded.

Col. Rowland Williams married Elizabeth, a daughter of Samuel Winthrope, Deputy Governor of Antigua, the widow of William Mildon of Nevis. By the time he died 20 July 1713, aged 80, they had produced two sons and four daughters.

The Newlands

It is not clear exactly when the Williams family acquired the Newlands on Weston Green Road, or indeed whether they had it built. The property, which according to its Grade II* listing dates from the late 1600s, was not identifiably referenced at Colonel Rowland Williams' death. Apart from some bequests to maintain his daughters of money, sugar, and a small number of slaves (one of whom was granted his freedom and two slave boys), he left all the rest of his estate to his surviving son Thomas Williams, who likewise became a Colonel. Thomas died in 1733, listed as "of Old Road Antigua and Newlands in Thames Ditton."

There has been some further confusion in that the Newlands has at various times been referred to as a Mansion House, and later as Weston Grove. It thus needs disentangling from Weston House across the green, now no longer in existence. I am fairly satisfied that the house that was part of the Imber

Court estate, known formally as "The" Mansion House, was the one which became Weston House and not the Newlands. It was built towards the end of Shem Bridges' life in about 1716; bequeathed by Henry Bridges to his niece Rose Bridges; became part of the Onslows' estate through marriages of Rose and her sister, and was sold by Lord George Onslow at auction to George Jarvis, whose estranged daughter, Lady Mary Twysden, sold it to the Lamberts.

That leaves the origin of the Newlands slightly more obscure. It is tempting – and may be apposite – to regard its name as a reference to the "new lands" being exploited in the Caribbean; and some of the design themes in the glorious plaster ceiling and oak paneling there seem to reflect that sort of heritage. But I have also come across a reference in the 1700s to John(?) Newland, with a house and an orchard in the manor: and if that was a family of several previous generations here, then "the Newlands" might be how the site was known to local people. At any rate, for the century it was in the Williams family it had about 12 acres attached, including Bason Field subsequently known as Basing Field.

Colonel Thomas Williams married Mary, daughter of Edward Byam, by Sarah, daughter of Samuel Winthrop - the same Deputy Governor of Antigua who had furnished Thomas' father with a daughter for a wife. Of their sons Rowland Williams and Edward Williams, both born at St John's the capital of Antigua, the former went via Queens College Oxford to become a doctor in New York and died in 1738-39, and the latter inherited. We know that in 1780 he was the owner of 250 slaves and 1030 acres on the island. Of two other sons, one, Samuel Williams, inherited the 'Horns' estate on Antigua.

from Penrith and they had two sons. The eldest, Rowland Williams, born in 1748, inherited three plantations on Antigua and the Newlands when Edward died in April 1784, aged 74, to be buried at Thames Ditton. This Rowland Williams married Mary Symes – these were the neighbours and friends of Catherine Lambert. His younger brother Samuel inherited a further plantation from Edward Williams.

Rowland Williams "of Antigua and Thames Ditton" died in 1826, his wife Mary a year later, both buried at Thames Ditton. His will named three estates in Antigua and he owned 121 slaves. A wealthy man in those times, apart from his properties and residual estate he left over £68,500 to his legatees. This included £5,000 to pay off some annuities which his son Captain Rowland Edward Louis Charles Williams "hath most imprudently and destructively to himself granted."

Which brings me to where I came in. Capt. in the 10th Hussars Rowland Edward Louis Charles Williams, born April 1784, whose contempt as a Hussar for Rev Wilfred Speer's drunken horsemanship may be well imagined, was - apart from an imprudent manager of finances - a Member of Council and Puisne Baron of Exchequer, Antigua. He grandly called his ancestral estate in the Caribbean "Claremont." Capt. Williams styled "of Weston Green, Surrey, and of Antigua," married Clara Susanna, second daughter of Major-General Sir Patrick Ross.

During their tenure the abolition of slavery, and the subsequent end of indentured labour on the plantations, put the finances of many Caribbean plantations in difficulties. To get the legislature through Parliament, financial compensation was offered to the plantation owners (but of course none to the poor souls whose fellows had sold them to Europeans as slaves).


Clara, Capt. Williams' wife, died at Claremont, Antigua, in March 1840. Capt. Williams testified against Rev Wilfred at the Court of Arches a year later, then returned to attend to his affairs in Antigua where he died in 1852. Their son Rowland Edward Louis Henry Williams of the 32nd Foot, born in October 1828 on Antigua, died 3 October 1867 at Upper Norwood. In his turn buried at St. Nicholas, he was described as "of Antigua and of Newlands in Thames Ditton."

But by then, the Newlands, for some while shorn of Basing Field which had come into the hands of Alexander Raphael, had been sold. Its subsequent occupants and its institutional history in the last century have been covered by others; it has returned to private hands in recent years and this fine old building has undergone a sympathetic restoration.





love, laughter and with a festive twist. The ticket for this show will include a glass of bubbly and a mince pie.


