

Thames Ditton High Street broken sewer

Rivers are not the only cause of flooding. There have been problems with the drain in Thames Ditton High Street. Examinations have shown that the main sewer in the High Street is cracked in places, with debris around the cracks, and is completely broken near the George & Dragon. At present Thames Water is declining to do anything about it. The RA is creating a lobby group to pressure Thames Water to take the situation seriously and mend the drains before a major incident occurs. Food Bank

In October the sheds at St Nicholas Church where the East Elmbridge Food Bank stores its supplies were broken into and a large amount was stolen.

St Nicholas Church has been a food bank distribution point since 2020 and helps about 40 adults and 20 children a month. The church's immediate response to the break-in was to emphasise that the church is here to help anyone who requires help, including the person/s who stole the items. The church can provide food but also support, company, and advice. This is all free and anyone is welcome.

Thames Ditton High Street enhancement grant

Thames Ditton has been allocated a grant of £5,000 from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund to enhance the appearance and facilities of our High Street. Local councillors have been canvassing ideas from retailers and residents. Once options and costs have been identified an application for the grant will be made.

Support for local charities

In the last few weeks the Annual Grants Scheme has been allocated (£135k) and the second round of the £500k Cost of Living fund allocations has been assessed. These grants are awarded to local charities to help Elmbridge residents in need. Local recipients included Citizens Advice Esher & District, CHEER (Concern and Help for East Elmbridge Retired) and Lower Green Community Centre.

Loss of tree in Weston Green

Weston Green residents may have noticed the disappearance of the large horse chestnut tree that stood outside Sexton's pub. Unfortunately, a large branch recently dropped off the tree and when the Council's Countryside Officer and Tree Officer inspected it, they found significant rot in the crown where rainwater had been pooling for some time. They decided it posed a significant health and safety risk, so it was regretfully removed.

Losing a local landmark tree is always sad, but the intention is to grind out the stump and plant a new feature tree this growing season to replace the horse chestnut. The suggestion is to plant a disease-resistant elm.

Hurst Recreation Ground

Elmbridge Borough Council (EBC) has confirmed that Hurst Pool will need to be refurbished or rebuilt in the coming years. A review of the options was considered at Cabinet in July ranging from a refurbishment of the current facility to a complete rebuild with significantly improved facilities. Several options were included in the report to the Cabinet as to how any improvements might be funded. No decisions have been taken about which of the options might be adopted going forward.

Climate change progress

Climate Emergency UK recently assessed UK councils' progress on climate action since 2019. EBC were rated joint second in Surrey and 15th in the whole of the South of England. The rating related to Council's actions on reducing emissions and tackling the climate emergency. This is good news and is a reflection of EBC's commitment to become a carbon neutral organisation by 2023.

Excel Leisure Centre

As part of the new leisure management contract between Places Leisure and EBC, the Excel Leisure Centre is currently undergoing a £6m refurbishment to provide brand new equipment, new studio spaces, and more energy efficient, innovative, and affordable facilities. In addition, the current gym will be significantly increased in size and fully remodelled. Improvements still to come include steam rooms, sauna, and salt room. These later projects are due to be completed in Spring 2024. The project is being fully funded by Places Leisure.

Torrington Road Car Park, Claygate

The Cabinet resolved at an extraordinary meeting in September, that, as the value to the community as a whole of maintaining the carpark (derived from undertaking wider community engagement with Claygate) would outweigh the benefits from the proposed development, the Council withdraw from negotiations with Kilo Properties Ltd and Marks and Spencer PLC.

Update from Nick Darby, our Surrey County Councillor



Boundary Commission submissions had to be in by October 16. Everything received by that date will be considered although no decision is expected for some months. It is unfortunate that due to an IT glitch, many submissions received an auto reply indicating they had not been received. Despite two requests by Surrey County Council the commission refused to extend the time scale.

Good news on highways. I have heard recently that the section of Embercourt Road between the railway bridge and Vera Fletcher Hall is to be resurfaced, along with Watts Road. Work is also to take place to prevent flooding on Summer Road by the level crossing.

I have continued to bring pressure to bear on Surrey Highways to refresh white and yellow lines in the Dittons. These include

markings on the Embercourt roundabout, the junction of Speer Road, Summer Road and Aragon Avenue and also Station Road with Speer Road.

The performance of Thames Water goes from bad to worse, as does the extent of residents' frustration. Thames Water is still refusing to carry out repairs to the broken drain on the High Street opposite Costa. This is despite four visits by them. What should be a simple job may turn out to be more complicated than it should be, possibly having to close and dig up the road.

We are asking residents to complain to Thames Water in the strongest possible terms. We have started a residents' group to co-ordinate action.

Restoring a local water vole haven -Hogsmill River conservation project



At the RA Nature and Climate Festival in September we were lucky to hear about the work being done locally to reintroduce water voles.

A Remarkable Journey

After water voles become locally extinct along the Hogsmill River in 2017, Citizen Zoo launched their "Get InVOLEd" project the following year to reintroduce the species to the river. Since its inception, the project has made significant strides in achieving its goals. With unwavering dedication, it has engaged with over 6,000 people, educating them about water voles and their critical role in the ecosystem.

The project boasts a dedicated team of more than 400 local volunteers actively participating in various events, meetings, and volunteer sessions. These volunteers are the heart and soul of the project and their hard work has resulted in the release of 101 water voles back into the river, marking a significant milestone for this initiative.

The Road to Reintroduction

The journey began with the training of 60 volunteers to conduct habitat surveys along all 10 kilometers of the river. Their findings were presented at the 2019 London Recorders Day at the Natural History Museum, laying the groundwork for the project's future actions.

Subsequently, the team purchased, constructed, and deployed ten aquatic mammal detection rafts to determine which species inhabited the river. This was crucial in identifying potential threats, including non-native American mink, the main driver

of water vole declines.

The project's community engagement efforts have been vital in creating awareness and fostering local support. The team conducts monthly strategy meetings and develops a comprehensive re-introduction plan, executed with the help of volunteers working in various groups, including community engagement, invasive species walker engagement, monitoring, dog fundraising, and habitat restoration. The latter has involved creating over 150 meters of dead hedging that provides a naturefriendly barrier to the riverbanks, helping protect it from human and dog footfall. Additionally, volunteers have assisted in removing invasive plant species, such as Himalayan balsam, and backfilling with over 1,500 native, water-vole-friendly river plants.

The Historic Release

August 2022 marked a historic moment for the project when 101 water voles were released back into the river. This involved housing the voles in pens along the river to allow them to acclimatise to their new surroundings. Over the week, 75 volunteers assisted with feeding the voles daily. The successful release was a testament to years of hard work and dedication, bringing the project closer to its ultimate goal of a self-sustaining water vole population in the region.

Partnerships & Collaborations

Get InVOLEd has not been a solitary effort. It is a collaborative endeavour, benefiting from partnerships with Thames Water, Greenspace Information of Greater London (GiGL), Kingston University, The Hogsmill Catchment Partnership, and funding from the Mayor of London. Additionally, the project enjoys the expertise of Derek Gow, the UK's leading water vole expert. The support from the Royal Borough of Kingston Council, and the Environment Agency has been invaluable in providing the necessary resources and endorsements.

Looking to the Future

While the water vole reintroduction is

complete, the project's work is far from over. Continuous monitoring of American mink and the water voles themselves is essential to ensure the survival and growth of the population. This is being carried out using aquatic mammal rafts and camera traps, as well as state-of-the-art bioacoustic sensors. Moreover, ongoing habitat restoration efforts will maintain the environment that water voles need to thrive. We are also delighted to have secured funding from Natural England's Species Recovery Grant for a secondary release in 2025. This is part of the South East Rivers Trust's WET Hogs Project, which we are excited to be leading the water vole component for.

With a successful reintroduction and an unwavering commitment to the cause, the project paves the way for a brighter future for water voles and their critical role in the ecosystem. Everyone is encouraged to get involved and support this vital project, ensuring the protection and prosperity of these remarkable mammals for generations to come.

Mr. Sherriff's Trust - celebrating 30 years advancing the arts in Elmbridge



In November there was a celebration in the Vera Fletcher Hall to celebrate the 30th anniversary of The R C Sherriff Trust, the charity established in 1993 to promote and develop the arts across the Borough.

The Trust was established through the will of the writer R C Sherriff, who lived in Esher for more than 40 years. He is probably most famous for writing '*Journey's End*', the play based on his experiences in the First World War. It was first staged 95 years ago with a young actor called Laurence Olivier in the lead role.

Sherriff would go on to become, at one stage, the highest-paid British screenwriter in Hollywood, scripting some of the most famous films of Hollywood's Golden Age, including *'The Invisible Man'*, *'Goodbye Mr Chips'*, *'The Four Feathers'*, *'That Hamilton Woman'* (Winston Churchill's favourite film) and most famously, one of the greatest films about the Second World War, *'The Dambusters'*. In 2017 a new screen adaptation of 'Journey's End' was released with Asa Butterfield (star of the Netflix hit, 'Sex Education').

His novels are regarded as classics of their time. 'The Hopkins Manuscript', a tale about a lunar catastrophe in which the moon collides with the Earth, is considered the missing link between H G Wells and John Wyndham. In 2020, The Guardian asked authors to suggest a novel that would help people get through the first lockdown and Nobel and Booker Prize winning author, Kazuo Ishiguro, chose Sherriff's 1930 novel '*The Fortnight in September*'.

For more than 40 years Sherriff lived in *"Rosebriars"*, his house in Esher, which he bequeathed to Elmbridge Borough Council, to be used for cultural purposes. In 1993, the Council used the proceeds from the sale of the property to establish the R C Sherriff Trust.

Since then, the Trust has been honouring Sherriff's wish. During the pandemic the Trust worked closely with venues such as Riverhouse Barn, the Vera Fletcher Hall, The Barn Theatre in Molesey and Elmbridge Borough Council to support organisations and individual artists at one of the most difficult time the arts have faced

The Trust's annual projects reach across the Borough, supporting thousands of residents of all ages.

The Rosebriars Project uses the arts to address issues of health, well-being and isolation amongst older people in Elmbridge through weekly singalongs, monthly art workshops and The Silver Screen Film Club & Sherriff Talks film club.

Established in 2014, Elmbridge School Choir Festival has become a highlight of the Elmbridge Cultural Calander, with the 2023 Festival involving almost 750 Elmbridge school children performing at ACS Cobham.

In 2023, the inaugural Adult Choir Festival, celebrating the wealth of musical talent across the Borough raised more than $\pounds1,500$ to be used to support local choirs develop their programme and work.

The Annual Elmbridge Literary Festival run in partnership with Elmbridge Borough

Council is now in its 19th year and has become a truly international affair with entries submitted from across the world.


Other initiatives include the R C Sherriff Young Musician of the Year and the biannual Moving Art Exhibition.

Since 1993, almost £2.5 million has been spent running projects and providing grants to arts venues, schools, community groups, arts organisations and individuals. The Trust has spent the past 30 years not only fulfilling the wish of R C Sherriff to advance the arts in Elmbridge, but also in bringing thousands of residents together to encourage their creativity and highlight the importance of music, theatre, dance, visual arts and literary arts in their everyday lives.

Thames Ditton Community Centre - update



An update from Cllr Gill Coates, TD&WGRA Councillor for Hinchley Wood and Weston Green and Portfolio Holder for Community Care in Elmbridge Borough Council.

Local residents may be aware that Elmbridge Borough Council is looking at how the Thames Ditton Centre for the Community opposite the library could operate in the future, but they may not understand the reasons why it is under discussion.

It starts with the fact that the centre is under-used. In 2023/24 it will cost council taxpayers more than £220,000 to run, but apart from the Dementia Services group (which is there every day), it is only open to the over-50s on Mondays and Thursdays. In all, just 50-60 people a week typically turn up for the activities on those days. The Council's lunch service for the elderly was attracting just one regular user.

It is simply not sustainable to run what has become a 'hall for hire'. We only have to look at our neighbour, Woking Borough Council, which is making £12.5 million cuts in discretionary spend (expenditure on council services which are nonstatutory, including community centres) to realise how lucky we are in Elmbridge to have a council which is both solvent and committed to helping residents in need. But Council budgets are under ever-increasing pressure. Local authority spending power has been cut by nearly a third in real terms since 2010. If we want to support elderly and vulnerable members of our community - and spend council tax payers' money more wisely - there has to be a better way of doing it.

The Council brought external in consultants to help us re-shape our discretionary Community Support Services to meet changing needs in the 2020s and ensure that they are sustainable going forwards. Those services currently reach just 2% of Elmbridge's residents, but we know that nearly 10% of residents are currently in need of some kind of support. That includes young families and children living below the poverty line - groups that we have not traditionally targeted with our services. The consultants suggested that the under-used Thames Ditton Centre could be handed directly to the local community to take over the running of it, thus releasing the Council's budgets to focus on delivering support services to more of the people in real need in Elmbridge.

Representatives from existing centre users and local community groups were invited to explore this idea, but nothing positive came from the discussions. However, there have been two interesting developments which could breathe new life into the center going forwards. In the summer the local Primary Care Network (PCN), a group of seven local GP practices, came forward with the idea of developing a community Health and Wellbeing Centre together. The NHS increasingly recognises the value of health creation and preventative care in non-medical environments - interventions that stop problems developing or worsening, such as diet and exercise advice to prevent Type 2 diabetes, or social singing groups to help with long Covid. They are increasingly working in partnership with others such as local councils to facilitate non-medical support such as debt counselling or gym sessions to reduce the root causes of physical and mental health issues.

More recently, a community group has approached Elmbridge Borough Council with a proposal which expands on the health and well-being concept to include 'eco' initiatives as well as other creative ways of bringing our community together.

Discussions and meetings are now under way with both groups to explore how we can bring these ideas to fruition, but it is still early days and absolutely no decisions have been made. It has always been the case that the existing groups that use the centre on Mondays and Thursdays - Men in Sheds, Boomerang Bags, a T'ai Chi class, an art class and a bridge club - will be able to continue to benefit from it, as their social and environmental value totally fits with the ethos of a community health, wellbeing and eco hub.

Unfortunately, the copy date for this issue of the magazine is too early to be able to say anything concrete about these developments, but as soon as there is anything new to share this community will be the first to know.



The BBC features Thames Ditton flood event



At the end of October Thames Ditton featured on the BBC News App and Tony Thompson, leader of the Residents' Association Flood Group, was interviewed by BBC Radio Surrey. Why? Because they were covering an exhibition and presentation that the Flood Group had organised on October 28 in St Nicholas Church Hall. The theme was 'Know your Flood Risk (and what you can do about it)'. Storm Babet was still wreaking havoc - although luckily not so much in Thames Ditton - so the risk of flooding was very much in residents' minds.

At the exhibition there were five stands ranging from Environment Agency (EA) advice to help you find out your flood risk and sign up for flood warnings; the RA Flood Group, providing local flooding information; the Watertight company, demonstrating a range of equipment that residents can have fitted to their homes to reduce flood risk; and FloodRe and Howden Insurance Brokers talking about house insurance and emphasising that you shouldn't have to pay more even if you live in a high-risk area.

It was a busy day with more than 130 people attending including our RA Borough councillors Caroline James and Elaine Sesemann and Surrey County Councillor Nick Darby. Everyone who came, and the presenters, was extremely positive about it.

The star of the show was probably Mary Long-Dhonau OBE, known as '*Flood Mary*'. She has been flooded eight times, although she lives nowhere close to a river. Each time was with increasingly less damage as the

'Build Back Better' concept, where flood protection is installed, reduced the damage. She drew attention to the heartbreak caused by flooding and gave us an insight into what we could expect if flooded, both during the flood and after while the clearing up and house repair operation goes on. She also gave examples of simple and inexpensive measures to protect one's property. See her excellent web site at *www.floodmary.com*.

It was great to have a range of experts in the room, especially as the impact of global warming is estimated to put 1 in 6 of properties in UK at risk of flooding in the future. Currently in Thames Ditton there are more than 300 properties in the *'high risk'* area (defined by the EA that each year these properties have a 3.3% chance of being flooded.)

Gareth Boyd from Watertight talked about (and displayed) a lot of property flood resilience equipment that can be used and offered a free initial survey to interested residents in the high-risk area. If you would like to sign up for this, contact the flood group on thamesdittonfloodgroup@gmail.com

One resident said: "I find it comforting to know that I can have a (free) appraisal of my property and advice on how to install a range of innovative tools to help prevent water ingress."

Harriet Boughton from FloodRe explained that this organisation was set up some 10 years ago to take over the flood risk from normal house insurers and spread the cost so that it remains affordable. In 15 years it will cease operations and is encouraging property owners to be more Flood Smart. See their website: *www.floodre.co.uk* for a host of ideas about how to build back better, be flood smart and create a flood-resistant garden.

Suzi Rackley from Howden Insurance Brokers talked about their experience in finding insurance cover for properties with flood risk. Broker A-Plan, part of their group, has an office in Kingston - tel. 0203 874 8640. Their two flood risk experts, Jo Payne and Christian Williams, are in Farnham tel. 01252 725725.

The EA provided general flooding information and help for residents to find out their flood risk and sign up for flood warnings. Tina Leishman, who was there from the EA, said: "The event you ran was a brilliant success. Thank you for inviting us. I signed up a number of people for flood alerts and warnings and showed people where their street was in terms of the risk of flooding maps." The link to check flood risk, flood warnings and current Thames River heights is: www.gov.uk/check-flooding

The EA also said that provisional findings suggest a temporary flood barrier is *"technically viable, however due to its complexity and scale, it cannot be considered for deployment this winter."* It is also looking at whether there are technically feasible and economically viable long-term measures for the area.

It was a very successful event with 86% of participants stating that they would be likely to take action to reduce their flood risk, compared with 55% before the event.

Residents' comments included: "It was great to have all the key people in one room." "All of the information in one place was very welcome." "All in all, a very positive day, especially as I have just received a flood alert!"

World War II, remembered



Following the observance of Armistice Day, local resident Lynn Jones remembers what it was like to be a child during wartime. (This is an extract from memories she shared with Thames Ditton Today).

I will always remember that day in September 1939 when we heard on the radio that we were at war with Germany. A few days later I was out on an errand when the sirens sounded. I had never heard that awful wail before.

Every house was supplied with an air raid shelter which had to be constructed. We were all issued with a gas mask, in a box, with a long cord that we put over our shoulder and carried everywhere.

Every evening the siren wailed and and we all had to spend the night in the shelter. Sleeping had to be arranged. There were two double bunks across the end. Ivy and Christine slept in the bottom bed, Marjorie and I in the top bed. The boys slept on the floor. Along the side there were two single bunks; mum slept in the bottom one and Dad in the top. Every morning we got up and went into the house to get washed and dressed. On school days we walked to school which was about a mile away, picking up shrapnel on the way.

Nights were always frightening - the bombing went on every night until 16 May 1941. One night a bomb landed on a nearby avenue and another hit a block of flats at the end of our road. The damage was tremendous and many local people were killed. At school we soon found out which children we would never see again.

On their 18th birthday, everyone received their call-up papers. Those fit enough were

allocated to the army, navy, air force or the coal mines.

My brother, Frank, volunteered for the air force and became a Spitfire pilot. He and an American were shot down over Italy and taken prisoner. We had a very worrying time with official letters saying that he must be presumed dead. Then mum got a letter from Frank to say they had escaped and managed to get back to their own lines to fly again!

My sister Marjorie was called up to join the Fleet Air Arm where she later met Ben, her husband. When I left school I joined the cast of a touring play. In Manchester, I was watching a film in a nearby cinema when a bomb fell close by. We heard that an elderly lady had been trapped inside an air raid shelter. I never went down into a shelter again, deciding I would rather be blown up than buried alive.

I became part of a double act performing in theatres and training camps entertaining the troops (ENSA). One night in Brighton we looked out of our bedroom window and saw what I thought were planes flying north. I think there may have been the first Doodlebugs. We could hear the drone overhead until the engine ran out of fuel and it crashed and exploded somewhere, we could only guess which direction.

After that came the V2 rockets, they were faster so we didn't hear them coming and there was no time to take shelter!

Today on Armistice Day I remember all the men and women who died. I also remember all the children who did not have a chance to grow up.

My wife died from breast cancer 22 years ago after a long period of treatment. I spent a lot of time looking after her and going to the Royal Marsden in Sutton for appointments.




